Session 1: First Incarnation — God revealed in and through Creation

Genesis 1:31 - God saw all that God had made - and it was very good

John Duns Scotus writes,

"Each and everything in creation has value in its own right and can only be known by direct acquaintance."

Seeing Differently: Franciscans and Creation P85

Bonaventure views the natural world sacramentally, calling it a book and a mirror because it points beyond itself to the Triune God upon whom it depends as efficient, exemplary and final cause. He recounts how God created the visible world "as a means of self-revelation so that, like a mirror of God or a divine footprint, it might lead man to love and praise his Creator." Creation is the 'outer book' that expresses an "inner book": the Word (God's Wisdom or Art) by whom God creates. Human beings are unique in creation by virtue of their ability to read *both* books.

John 1:1-4

Terra Divina

<u>Go</u> for a walk or look out of a window; let your attention be caught. This may be a gift (Lectio)

<u>Ask yourself</u>: what has caught my attention – and why might this be a gift? (Meditatio)

<u>Allow</u> whatever has caught your attention to carry your prayers or yearnings. (Oratio)

Finally, <u>let go</u> of whatever has caught your attention, and enjoy the possibility of sacred presence. (Contemplatio).
